Fyrirhuguð ferð formanns borgarráðs til Bratislava

Fyrirhuguð er ferð formanns borgarráðs til Bratislava til að taka þátt í tveimur ráðstefnum sem haldnar verða dagana 27.-29. maí.

Á fundi Bandalags frjálsra borga - Pact of Free Cities - þann 27. maí mun Reykjavíkurborg fá formlega aðild að sáttmálanum, sem borgarstjórar Bratislava, Búdapest, Varsjá og Prag lögðu grunn að árið 2019 til að standa vörð um lýðræði og vinna gegn þjóðernishyggju sem átti þá vaxandi fylgi að fagna á þjóðþingum þessara landa. Með undirritun sáttmálans verður Reykjavík í hópi 33 borga sem hafa skuldbundið sig til að leggja áherslu á það mikilvæga hlutverk sem borgir heims gegna í að varðveita og vernda lýðræði og opið samfélag, og að borgarstjórar séu öflugir talsmenn þess á alþjóðlegum vettvangi.

Formaður borgarráðs verður með erindi á fundinum þar sem málefni Úkraínu verða í brennidepli, og mun fá umboð til að undirrita yfirlýsingu sem kennd er við Bratislava – Bratislava Declaration of the Pact of Free Cities. Einnig verður stofnaður vinnuhópur valinna borga um loftslagsvænni hverfi fyrir fjölskyldur og börn (sjá fylgiskjöl).





Bratislava Declaration of the Pact of Free Cities

Preamble

Highlighting an indispensable active role of cities in tackling global challenges which pose a burden as much as they represent an opportunity.

Echoing that safe child-friendly urban environment requires safeguarding our universal values as only open societies nourishing individual freedoms can guarantee healthy advancement of our children.

Emphasizing that democratic deficit at state level endangers our urban communities which is particularly disturbing in case of building safe and stimulating children's environment.

Reaffirming that the Pact's mission and its values are of universal merit which cannot be taken for granted and they maintain their global significance demonstrated by the growing membership since Pact's inception.

Recalling that it is city leaders who are at the forefront of the Pact's functioning, and they are responsible for shaping Pact's mission.

Reassuring of the Pact's determination to cooperate with other initiatives on addressing global challenges while the Pact preserves and enhances locally-driven democratic communities and respect for rule of law.

Confirming that standing for our values also means their active protection and support for international regulatory mechanisms aimed at harbouring them.

Recognizing that urban development requires respect for subsidiarity and fair financing for cities as metropolitan growth centres.

Our mission

- Our Pact is a shield for values of open society underlying a unique role of cities in promoting versatile and inclusive growth and an opportunity for continuous information exchange and knowledge-sharing.
- Being true to our mission, we strive to build a legacy which shall be here to stay. The legacy
 cemented by the joint vision of freedoms, creativity, ensured development, solutions to variety of
 divisions and global environmental and technological challenges.
- Like-minded city leaders have gone together a remarkable path. From the founding declaration through humanitarian actions towards Ukrainian cities and their citizens to global initiatives underpinning democracy or cities' fair financing.
- Our Pact represents an open and informal community of solidarity striving for transformative changes towards green and digital societies bringing far-fetched and lasting improvements.
- Over years, we have gone global demonstrating that universal values and endeavours towards flourishing cities as centres of wellbeing are shared in hugely different corners across the globe.
- At the same time, Pact's expansion manifests that city leaders perceive urgency to take action in support of the shared values of open society as well as visions of social and economic harmonious development of their cities.

Political threats and our responses

- Democratic backsliding of the current political systems is manifested in symptoms such as
 governments monopolizing public institutions and judicial power, hampering free media, while
 promoting hoaxes and factless information with limited public accountability, and increased
 nepotism in otherwise impartial public service.
- Parochial nationalistic chauvinism and hegemonistic tendencies of) authoritarian regimes as well as xenophobia and exclusion undermine economic, social, and territorial stability of societies all over the globe.
- Cities stand for open society, freedom of speech, political pluralism, justice, rule of law, and fairness as well as gender equality in pursuing opportunities.
- Cities support international regulatory or informal mechanisms harbouring rule of law including the use of sanctions against trespassers.
- The Pact fully underlines EU Capital Mayors' Conclusions of the 13th Direct Dialogue on the Rule of Law at the local level of 23 January 2024 echoing our commitment to preserve and champion the rule of law, democracy, and an open society.

Upholding values globally

- The Pact of Free Cities upholds the values of human dignity, democracy, freedom, equality, rule of law, and human rights. We advocate globally for these principles, even in the face of oppression and aggression.
- As democrats, we stand with peace, freedom, and justice organizations and offer solidarity to those advocating for these principles in Russia. We call for unity in our pursuit of democracy and encourage other cities to join us in action.
- The Pact strongly condemns any political violence performed against individuals or groups. We call for peaceful dialogue and deliberation to combat the growing polarisation of our societies.

Role of the cities in facing the common global challenges

- Cities are well-equipped to tackle global megatrends notably transition to green and digital economy. They attract talents by providing room for inspiration, innovation, creativity, or unconventional problem-solving and versatile approaches.
- Cities can play a role model for successful national green and digital policies due to attracting highly productive, vibrant, and grass-rooted economic and social activities.
- Increasing inequalities and a decline of once flourishing industrial centres contribute to growing sense of distrust towards public authorities including municipalities. Inhabitants in these localities perceive themselves and their environment as being abandoned by their representatives and their discontent being negligible. It is cities' utmost duty nowadays to reverse this gloomy trend and provide their inhabitants with opportunities raising their self-esteem and a sense of engagement.
- Quality of life is a particularly sensitive issue when concerning children, their access to education, social and health care services, and opportunities to live in safe and stable environments.
- Our conference on safe urban neighbourhoods as the accompanying event manifests that safe children environment is high on our agenda.
- Functioning rule of law also demonstrates a secured environment for our children as it restricts their exposure to harmful social developments.

Urban development and place-based policies

- Metropolitan areas play a central role in local and regional developments. Cities as their hearts concentrate essential economic and social activities and they are conducive to developing fresh innovative ideas.
- Place-based policies are essential for urban development as they address megatrends of economic, social, and technological transformations related to environmental challenges, arrival of disruptive technologies and automation, population aging or migration.
- Furthermore, place-based policies seek to address various inequalities and local disparities by leveraging on their potential. Place-based policies express cities' confidence to pursue their development goals independently of, yet in constructive cooperation with national level.
- Place-based policies are capable to counter public discontent as they promote economic development by valorising local cultural assets and traditions. Thus, place-based policies diminish a popular sense of being abandoned and neglected.
- Governance in place-based policies manifests adherence to democratic principles where public mobilisation and engagement are an essence of policymaking.

Direct and just funding of the cities

- Cities are growth inducing. To pursue their development goals, cities need to have guaranteed equal opportunities to access both, domestic and international public sources.
- Cities as metropolitan centres need just budgetary environment ensuring fair revenue distribution and a guaranteed direct access to great variety of grant and loan schemes.





European Mayors' Early Years Alliance

Working Group on Neighborhood Adaptation for a Child- and Family-Friendly Climate Future

Chaired by Bratislava Mayor Matuš Vallo and Capita

Mayor Vallo will convene a Mayor's Alliance and working group of thirty cities to address the urgent challenge of scaling climate adaptation projects that explicitly center children's and families' wellbeing.

The Alliance Working Group will develop projects in two phases:

- Phase 1 is a mentorship and knowledge-exchange network of thirty cities (2024).
- Phase 2, ten selected cities will be awarded challenge funding for implementation in years two and three (2025-26).

The Alliance and Working Group will be launched at the Start with Children Summit, May 28, 29, 2024.

Problem Statement

Climate change is one of the greatest threats to security and stability that humanity has ever faced. Today, in the climate change era, we face more extreme weather events that not only cause day-to-day interruptions to our lives but also have a ripple effect on the lives of families and young children, especially those who have been historically marginalized. Our cities, buildings, and homes must adapt to create environments where young children and families can be safe and healthy and grow to be resilient and flourish.

Threats from climate change are multiplied for infants and young children, yet there is a meager investment in the adaptive capacity of child- and family-serving systems. Building that adaptive capacity has positive spillover effects that build climate resilience and the flourishing of entire communities and societies.

Too few European cities have climate action plans that comprehensively address neighborhood adaptation, and even fewer adequately address the unique needs children and caregivers have from the built environment as cities warm.

Two major opportunities are being missed

1. For the rest of our lifetimes, infrastructure loans, grant programs, and the like will be further tied to climate resiliency; the time to build capacities within cities to apply for, manage, and deliver these projects is now.

2. Secondly, the social, moral, economic, and political value of shaping government policy for early childhood and family thriving is well documented by cities who have shown resolute leadership in this regard; more cities need to adopt and lead with this premise.

Premise of Working Group: Building a Pilot to Policy Pipeline

The premise of the working group is to ask the simple question: If you had to build the evidence to make an urban/climate policy change for children and families, what would that pilot project be?

The Mayor's Alliance will lay the foundation for building tangible and replicable models for climate-adaptive physical interventions supporting early childhood care, with a focus on policy change, fostering collaboration among cities along the way.

This effort will bring together city officials, researchers, and donor institutions to address the unique challenges climate change poses to the healthy development of young children and the well-being of their families and caregivers.

By leveraging the expertise and commitment of city leaders, this initiative aims to create lasting impacts and contribute to the global discourse on children's health in the context of urban climate resilience. The alliance will focus on European cities, including the Caucasus, Central Asia, and Eastern Mediterranean.

Admission to the Working Group

Working Group cities will be divided into three "tiers" based on their level of experience. The working group is open to 15 Pact of Free Cities member cities, and 15 external cities by invitation. Pact cities are admitted on a first-come first-served basis.

Tier 1

City administrations with a proven track record of implementing local-level climate adaptation projects and/or significant child/caregiver-friendly projects.

Tier 2

City administrations with a progressive approach to urban planning and political will for change, but without an explicit framing on children and climate. Ready to be more bold and could use help with where to begin.


Tier 3

Cities that need a little bit of convincing and inspiration, or new administrations who have not yet implemented anything but who are eager to begin.

Working Group Team Composition

The mayor of each city is included in the working group by default, and is encouraged, though not required, to attend regular meetings.

Each working group team will consist of two city representatives, including at least one deputy-level official, and one change-maker from inside the city. Cities may also invite local partners they have established relationships with to develop projects. (though these won't be invited to travel to in-person meetings).



Year 1 Working Group Process and Time Expectation

Teams will be expected to attend one online meeting per month, organized around a theme. Themes will cover Climate Finance, Capacity-Building, ECD Science, Design, Project Development. NB timeline below is all TBC.
